Dear Padre,

The Church is steeped in symbolism, tradition, and "living metaphors," but it sometimes forgets common sense. Why smell up the church with incense? Why gussy up the Mass with horns, flutes, and guitars, at times turning holy Mass into a pseudo-hootenanny?

The Mass is our high point of worship. All other sacred actions and activities of the Christian life "are bound up with it, flow from it, and are ordered to it" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 16). The dignity and importance of worshiping the Father in and through Christ at Mass is expressed in communion with fellow believers, and ideally through a full sensory experience with all our heart, mind, and soul. In short, if something is worth doing, it's worth doing well—especially if "doing" opens us to the mystery of God's presence through what we see, hear, smell, touch, and taste. "In the liturgy the sanctification of women and men is given expression in symbols perceptible by the senses and is carried out in ways appropriate to each of them" (Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy [Sacrosanctum Concilium], 7).

Not all Mass occasions call for "smells, bells, toots, and flutes," but the visual beauty of the sacred surroundings, the sounds of sacred music, and the sacred words and actions that connect us to our traditions and to Christ's memorial institution, are intended to elevate us in our collective prayer to God. At times, such a sublime experience of the transcendent may be inhibited by sheer practicality, efficiency, and mundanity!

From the Pastor's Desk

It's OK for family to disagree. This is the case between Jesus and His cousin, John the Baptist in today's Gospel. John was trained by a third group of Jewish believers called 'the Essenes' (the other two were the Pharisees and the Sadducees). Essenes lived a strict, monastic life with strong adherence to Torah, the Decalogue, prayer, and penitential practices. Thanks to the Essenes we have the oldest, original copies of the Old Testament. John the Baptist closely imitated the Essene lifestyle in his preaching, interpretation of the Law, and asceticism.

John the Baptist may have been confused because he was expecting Jesus to do more separating of the wheat from the chaff, as we heard him warn last Sunday. Many assumed that the Messiah would lead the worthy to victory and condemn the sinful. Instead, Jesus has spent His time healing the afflicted and blessing the oppressed. It's as if John is waiting for the other shoe to drop. Jesus suggests the Messiah's mission is actually somewhat different, no offense. Jesus reminds His disciples in today's Gospel the wonders, healings, and miracles He has done. Jesus comes not as a vindicator but as a Prince of Peace and Healing.

Bambinelli Sunday, December 22

Bambinelli Sunday is a beautiful tradition that was started by Pope St. John Paul II. Bambinelli is Italian, the plural of *bambinello* which means "little baby [boy]." Bambinelli Sunday is celebrated on Gaudete Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent. Thousands of people come to St. Peter's Square bringing the Baby Jesus figurines from their crèches and nativity scenes; then, at the time of the Pope's Angelus address, he blesses all the little figures of the Child Jesus. Families also traditionally spend their Advent season making small sacrifices or doing good deeds for the Child Jesus, represented by adding a piece of straw to His manger for each good deed performed. When Christmas day arrives, the Baby Jesus is placed in the empty crèche made comfortable by these acts of charity. Here at St. Clare & St. Stephen, we wait till the Fourth Sunday of Advent for this celebration. Please bring your Baby Jesus to church and place it in the manger to be blessed at Mass. We also ask that one mark their Baby Jesus to make sure you take the correct one home.

The Journey to Bethlehem

An approximately 70-mile journey (4-5 days) from Galilee to Bethlehem with a very pregnant woman would have been a long, exhausting, uncomfortable journey. Mary and Joseph would have traveled light, carrying only the things they would need to welcome a newborn baby. They wouldn't have taken anything unnecessary because that would make the trip more difficult. We can learn from their example by removing from our lives anything that will weigh us down on our journey to see baby Jesus. Now is a good time to simplify and renew our families, carefully folding and packing only that which we need as our Advent time of Preparation draws to a close. As we de-clutter our lives, we can't forget to include the most important work of cleaning out the dirt that has accumulated in our souls. The Sacrament of Confession wipes our souls clean so that when we stand before the manger to greet the babe, He will delight in our purity. We can be sure that prayer was central to Mary's and Joseph's preparation: silent, constant, contemplative prayer as well as vocal worship. Their daily work was a prayer. The necessary tasks of getting ready for a new baby would have been done lovingly for the good of the other and offered willingly to God. There would have been joyful anticipation as Mary prepared the swaddling clothes. Joseph may have made a little crib, being careful to smooth away all the splinters and rough edges, lovingly seeing to every detail of his work.

Almighty God,

As we journey on this Pilgrimage of life just as Mary and Joseph journeyed to Bethlehem for the census,

lift our arms to help,

strengthen our hearts to love,

and fill our voices to sing, as we see those who need our assistance this Christmas season. Like Mary, there are many whom the world turns their gaze from.

Open our minds to knowledge and truth, and help us to grow in service to your Church and the world.

May the Word become flesh to us just as it did in Mary's womb and may Good St. Joseph guide and protect us wherever we go. We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.
